

Scott Researcher in Cell and Developmental Biology



Soror Jamil Bennette Scott is the only African American female to receive her doctorate of philosophy in 2007-2008 in cell and developmental biology in the Division of Medical Sciences at Harvard Medical School, a program which is a part of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences at Harvard University in Cambridge, Massachusetts. At Harvard Soror Scott served as the co-chair of the Minority Biomedical Scientists of Harvard, and the committee chair for the Biomedical Science Careers Program Abstract and Poster Presentations Workshop. Soror Scott is currently a researcher at the Center for Community-Based Research at the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute, a Harvard Medical School affiliated cancer center, working in cancer prevention and control and is contributing to a study focused on defining the optimal dose for vitamin D supplementation for chemoprevention in African Americans. She received her B.S. summa cum laude in 2000 in biology from Tennessee State University where she was fully funded through the Presidential Foundation Honors and Out-of-State Tuition Waiver Scholarships. Soror Scott has been a member of Delta Tau Omega Chapter since 2003.
